AN UNEXPECTED SIGHTING

Introduction

Jesus was dead. Secret disciples buried him. It was finished. A joyless despair hung over those who followed Jesus. Darkness was everywhere as the first day of the week arrived. Mary Magdalene made her way to the tomb, shocked by what she saw. The stone was rolled from the tomb. Her mind began to race, but she only had one theory—someone had stolen the body. She raced to tell the disciples. Peter and John dashed to the tomb, and what they saw would change them forever. This is the place for John where he believed.

Mary stays consumed by grief. However, when she stoops to look in the tomb again, she is met by two angels who have a question, "Why are you weeping?" She is so consumed by her pain that she misses the reality of what's taking place. Then it happens—AN UNEXPECTED SIGHTING. Jesus meets her in the garden, but she doesn't recognize him. Jesus calls her by name, and finally, she sees. Overcome by joy, she holds on tightly, but Jesus sends her on a mission. Go and tell his family he's alive and ascending to the Father. May her words be our words—I have seen the Lord!

Outline

Sundays are a reminder that God acts in power on your behalf (v. 1).

Resurrection power is at work even when you are tired, discouraged, hopeless, or ready to give up (vv. 2-4).

Some people stay on the outside and look around, some come inside and remain spectators, but some come inside and see and believe (vv. 5-8).

Supernatural experiences do not guarantee faith (vv. 12-15).

Grace adopts us into God's family, unleashing unrivaled fatherly care and provision (v. 17).

Jesus sends you to share the good news (vv. 17-18).
